Report of the 2016 Annual Meeting

San Antonio Colony Governor Debbie Werner and the San Antonio Colony members did a splendid job of hosting the 85th Annual Meeting of the Texas Society of Mayflower Descendants this past April 1-2 at the historic Menger Hotel in downtown San Antonio, where the Texas Society was first organized.

Activities started Friday evening as Governor Rick Denham chaired a Board of Assistants meeting, which ratified the actions approved by email voting since the last Board meeting, followed by a Governors Reception featuring hot hors d'oeuvres and live music.

On Saturday, Governor Denham chaired the General Meeting morning and afternoon sessions, separated by a nice luncheon and a fascinating talk by William Groneman about the actual background of David Crockett, who was killed just across the street at the Alamo. The meeting included reports from many of the officers, committees, and Colonies. We voted on the proposed Bylaws changes, all of which were approved. We also voted to increase our Annual Donation to the General Society from \$1,000 to \$1,620, to go to the Governor General's 1620 Fund in the name of our Annual Award Honoree. This will make our Honoree a member of the GSMD 1620 Club for that year. We also voted an additional \$250 contribution to have a memorial brick placed on the Octagon area of the Mayflower House Garden Walkway, inscribed with the name of our Honoree. A very nice memorial service was held in remembrance of our members who passed away since our last meeting. Peggy Marsh, Junior Committee Chairman, held a Junior Membership workshop. All of the motions made can be found on our web site, http://texasmayflower.com.

The Endowment Committee presented a proposal to create a 2020 Texas Mayflower Fund, which was approved. The purpose of this Fund is to significantly enhance our ability to support our scholarships and education activities and to bring attention to the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower landing. There will be a four (4) year period of solicitation (2016-2020) with a goal of raising \$125,000. This will allow us to contribute an additional \$4,000 to our scholarships and an additional \$1,000 to our educational activities.

Governor Denham chaired the second Board of Assistants meeting which followed the General Meeting where the budget for 2016-2017 was presented and approved.

The day ended with a wonderful banquet. Guest speaker, Susan Snow, helped us understand "Why the San Antonio Missions Are Worthy of World Heritage Designation."

Dwight Benson, Awards Committee Chairman, and Central Texas Colony Governor, announced that Prarie Counce, Corresponding Secretary and DFW Colony Governor, is the recipient of the 2016 Annual Award.

At the close of business, Governor Denham adjourned the meeting.

To enable us to provide the above items every year, we need to raise about \$125,000 by 2020, beginning this year. These funds will supplement our existing Mayflower Fund to enable these plans.

Why should you consider supporting this effort?


- Honor your Mayflower heritage

Help us to make this goal to significantly enhance our Mayflower heritage footprint in Texas!




The meeting was adjourned and members enjoyed a wonderful picnic lunch with anniversary cake, and leisurely walk through the adjacent rose gardens.

Meet Jason Sharer, Texas First Junior Family Historian

Mayflower Junior, Jason Sharer, became the first Texas Junior Family Historian. The composition competition, "Hit Me with a Brick, I Did Not Know That", required that the Junior have a conversation with a family member most familiar with their family history. The primary idea was for the Junior to learn *new* information about his or her family which would be passed to the next generation. Jason received a brick which will be inscribed with Jason's name and *Texas Junior Family Historian 2016* and will be placed on the Garden Walkway at the Mayflower Society House in Plymouth. Jason interviewed his grandfather, Stan Kuenn, not a Pilgrim descendant, but a serious family historian.

Jason's mother, Kelly Sharer, is understandably proud. "Jason is 12 years old attending 6th grade in the Conroe ISD. His school chose him to participate in their Math Olympiad and History Bee competitions. He also helped design and run a station for the district's SciMathelon competition. In March, he planned, organized, and led a free, community event to celebrate Pi Day to help keep middle school and elementary kids engaged in math and science. Jason participated in FLL robotics for the past three years, working as captain of his school's team this year. In February, his team won the robot games at the Bayou City Tournament of Champions. Jason has also taken several online college-level classes. He has completed six classes from universities such as MIT, Harvard, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology and the University of Edinburgh. Outside of school, Jason is active in swimming. He is already a Texas qualifier for the State Games of America in 2017. He has been active in scouting since the age of six. He enjoys listening to music, reading science fiction, playing chess, playing soccer, running, pole vaulting and engaging in political discussions."

Jason shared what he learned from his interview. I learned about a boy who was a very good swimmer, just like me. One of my ancestors, Joseph De Silva, had a farm in the Madeira Islands. One day, he was about 16 and was sitting on the shore when British soldiers came up to him and forced him aboard the ship. He was treated as their prisoner. Eventually, the British ship went to America to fight in the Revolutionary War. When the shipped arrived, Joseph, being a good swimmer, jumped over board and swam over a mile to shore to escape. He couldn't speak any language other than Portuguese, but a kind man from Philadelphia picked him up in a wagon and brought him back to the house. After about a year, he joined the militia with the man, but he was captured by the British again and taken to Staten Island. There, he heard about the British General Howe's plans. He quickly escaped by swimming to the New Jersey shore. He met with General George Washington and told him of Howe's plans. He got so close to General Washington that he noticed his pock-marked face. Washington offered to release him from the army, but he really hated the British, so he kept his position. At the end of the war, he was granted 640 acres of land. Ironically, he died at age 87 from drowning.
